Captive dietary needs: Generally accepting of a mixture consisting of soaked cat kibble, softbill mix, commercial meat diet, and insects. Mealworms, bloodworms, and other live insects can be used for training and for calming nervous/flighty birds. During the breeding season, the amounts of live insects should be increased and sprinkled with Calcium carbonate

AGE AT SEXUAL MATURITY



Males 1 year



Females 1 year

Incubation period: 22-28 days

Fledgling Period: Precocial; Young are independent soon after leaving natal area, but sometimes stay with parents until the next breeding season.

CLUTCH SIZE, & EGG DESCRIPTION



2-4 cream to clay-colored eggs



NEST SITE DESCRIPTION

Nest on bare, dry ground, usually in a hollow scrape, unlined or lined with grasses or other plant material and debris, or with a rim of earth and small shells or stones.



CHICK DEVELOPMENT

Chicks are precocial and grow rapidly, reaching adult size at only one month of age, but recommended to keep with parents for about 6 months.



PARENTAL CARE

Both adults care for chicks.

Minimum Group Size: Generally kept in pairs but in some situations, multiple single-sex birds can be compatible.

Maximum Group Size: Generally kept in pairs but in some situations, multiple single-sex birds can be compatible.



MANAGEMENT CHALLENGES

Head trauma if flighty birds contact the ceiling of their exhibit. Clipping individuals when introduced to a new exhibit may prevent head injuries. Angel wing and leg issues are common in captive lapwing species and should be watched for.

ADDITIONAL COMMENTS

They generally have carpal spurs that can sometimes be sharp and cause minor cuts/scratches to humans when the birds are caught.
